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

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


Medi-Cal managed care programs in 29 counties in California	Medi-Cal members in managed care who have specific eligible chronic conditions. Only members who are experiencing homelessness or are unstably housed would receive the housing navigation and tenancy sustaining services.						
Department of Health Care Services	Mental Health Services Act, Community Services and Support Component	Acquire, rehabilitate, or construct supportive housing; rental assistance, security deposits, utility payments, moving cost assistance; project-based housing, including master leasing units; and outreach. 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Department of Health Care Services	Homeless Mentally Ill Outreach and Treatment Program	\$50 million in total one-time funding, to be allocated across 50 counties, for multi-disciplinary teams engaged in intensive outreach, treatment, and related services for homeless persons with mental illness. Proposed budget bill language provides that counties could not use funding from this appropriation to supplant other funds for these purposes but would be encouraged to use the grant funds to leverage other fund sources, such as federal grants.
